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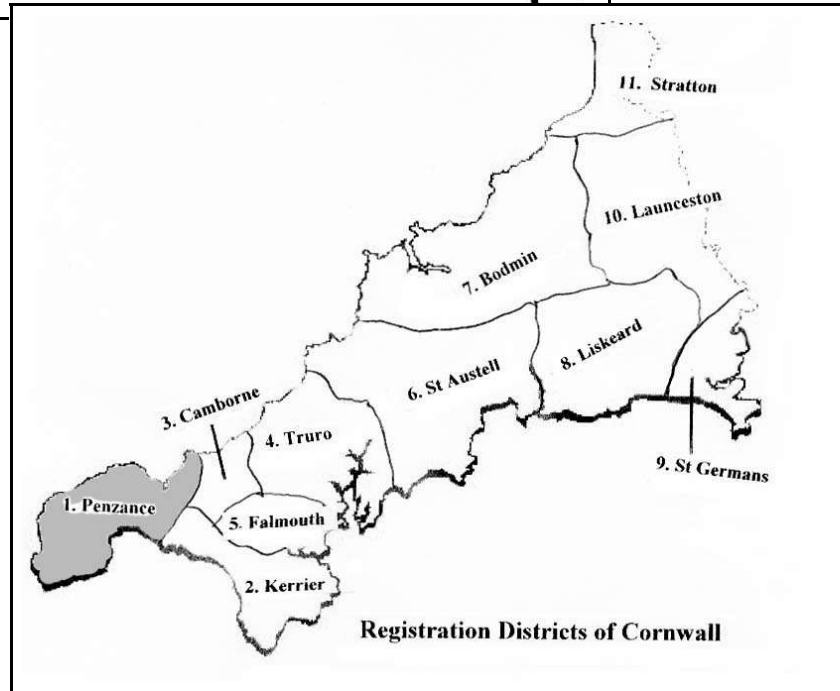
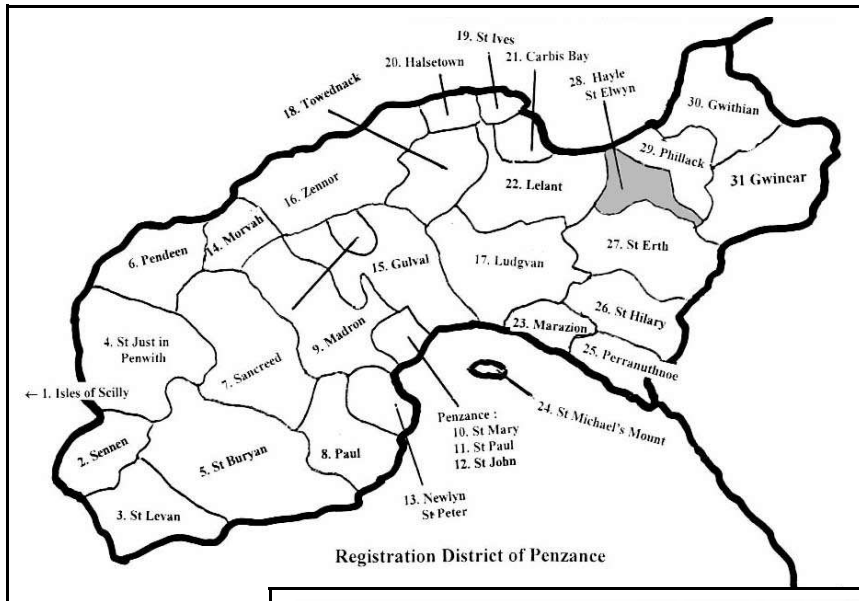

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The Parish of Hayle - St Elwyn.

The parish was constituted in 1870, being carved out of the western part of the parish of Phillack. This tiny parish of only 198 acres was centred around the needs of the Harvey iron foundry at the western end of Hayle, whilst the medieval Parish of Phillack mainly served the needs of the eastern end of the town where the Cornish Copper Company was based.

For the first eighteen years of its existence the new parish did not have a church, services were conducted in the neighbouring parish of Phillack in the Mission Church of St John's. In 1884 a site was found for the parish church and designed by the architect John D. Stedding and built by R. Stanslake of Plymouth, the foundation stone was laid on 5th May 1886 and the church consecrated on 5th August 1888 and dedicated to the fifth century Irish missionary St Elwyn, the Martyr. The church lies in a dominant position described rather romantically described : "The church sits very like a Breton church overlooking the strand and harbour, and is the focal point of all the views into and across the town, and is at the precise junction of the two opposing townships that made up Hayle, providing a symbolic as well as a physical meeting point for the two communities"

There is no burial ground in this parish and so there are no Parish burial records. The parish has maintained its own baptism and marriage records since 1888.

Historically Hayle was one of Cornwall's most important industrial towns. It is internationally important as some of the world's largest steam engines were manufactured in the town and these were designed by some of the most renowned engineers, including Richard Trevithick. Engines were exported to mining regions over the world. Located on the north Cornish coast, the beautiful Hayle estuary has been a maritime centre from ancient times. During the eighteenth century the port gained great importance importing coal from South Wales and returning copper ore for smelting. Hayle was the home of The Cornish Copper Company as well as the Copperhouse Foundry and Harvey's Foundry. This latter foundry was located in the west end of the town, adjacent to the area called Foundry Square, and employed over 1,000 people in its heyday and there was great rivalry between the two foundries. The increase in population at both ends of this elongated town resulted in the creation of the small parish of Hayle St Elwyn in 1870.

The foundries had ceased operations by the beginning of the twentieth century but there is much that remains of the industrial and maritime past and efforts are being made to take advantage of this both in terms of preserving the past, creating employment and enhancing the environment. The area is included within the Cornish bid for World Heritage Site status.

A Methodist Chapel was located in Foundry Square, built 1845, sadly now converted to public use as a commercial market area. This chapel has unusual 19th century window tracery. A new Methodist Chapel is located in Chapel Terrace and the former Baptist Chapel in Commercial Road was converted to a Catholic Church in the 1950s.

A total of 51 memorials were found with 200 names.

The Parish Church of St Elwyn - Memorials

- 1 This window was erected to the glory of God and in dear thankful memory of WILLIAM HORSBURGH M.A. (1835 - 1927) and of his friends FRANK HARVEY of Glanmor Hayle (1835 - 1926) and ANNE his wife (1840 - 1933) who together laboured in the lord in the building of this house of God. RIP.
This inscription appears on a delabole slate on a central pillar dividing two pairs of lights on "The Great West" or "Friendship Window" on the west wall. The four lights carry fourteen figures, in pairs, representing friendship. These are summounted by a vesica which has the figure of the Virgin and child together with the arms of the Diocese of Truro and those of Cornwall.
- 2 This font is an offering from the members of the Bible Class of S. Elwyn A.D. 1887.
Brass plaque fixed to the base of the polyphant stone font.
- 3 Carried with pride the Hayle Royal British Legion Standard. 1922 to 1996.
A plaque located near the Old Standard in the north-west corner of the church.
- 4 In loving memory of WILLIAM JAMES HOSKING private 2nd Batt. DCLI., killed in action on March 18th 1915, near St Eloi, France. He was the first of the men from Hayle to die for his King & country.
Brass plaque (blackened) pressed out with crucifixion scene. Signed by artist : JOHN WILLIAMS 1916.
- 5 In loving memory of JAMES PILL aged 18 years. S.S. teacher. RIP. From K. K.
Alabaster staupe of Our Lady (small) on wooden plinth which has brass plaque attached, all placed on window ledge.
- 6 In loving memory of EMILY WRIGHT daughter of the late Rev. WILLIAM HOCKIN Rector of Phillack, who fell asleep Christmas Day, 1911. RIP.
Brass plaque located just below coloured glass window.
- 7 To the memory of RACHEL LOUISE WILLIAMS 10 June 1984 - 1 January 2000.
*This dedication is followed by a three verse poem by :
CHRIS MCQUILLEN WRIGHT Curate 1995 - 1999.
A framed parchment standing in window ledge.*
- 8 This brass is erected in grateful recognition of the zealous & faithful service of the Rev. WILLIAM HORSBURGH B.A. Vicar of the Parish of St Elwyn from its creation in 1870 to 1892. His untiring efforts contributed largely to the building of this church which was consecrated Oct. 9th 1888.
Brass plaque in marble frame above window.
- 9 In grateful memory of MARGARET ALICE RATCLIFFE by whose generous gift this church was renovated in the year 1968. RIP.
Wooden plaque, painted letters.
- 10 A.M.D.G. The Christus Rex Crucifix over the high altar was given in loving memory of R. G.FAITHFULL (Priest) vicar 1941 - 71. W. T. ANDREWS (Priest) vicar 1930 - 1941. P. E. F. BERRY (priest) vicar 1899 - 1930. Also of WILLIAM SARA (Priest), ADAH SARA, CLAUDE SARA (Priest), EDMUND SARA (Bishop) & LEWIS SARA, HARRY BOASE, THOMAS G. CHINN, ELIZABETH J. CLEMENCE, LILLIAN DANIELS & DESMOND TREMBATH. RIP.
Brass plaque.
- 11 In loving memory of ELWYN BERRY aged 6 weeks died Dec. 7 1900. RIP.
Coloured glass window, inscription in bottom lights. It pictures St Joseph.
- 12 In loving memory of Sergt. JOHN RICHARDS died on active servive for his king and country in East Africa July 7 1916 aged 27 years. Buried at Mbuguni, and of his little daughter aged 5 months died at Johannesburg Oct 6 1916. This window is dedicated by his wife, father, mother, sisters and brother, of West Terrace, Hayle. "How sleep the brave who sink to rest, with all their country's wishes blest."
Coloured window depicting John the Baptist. Brass plaque fixed to window sill.
- 13 Stations I-VII. In loving memory of COLIN HUNT RIP.
Small brass plaque between Stations of the Cross.
- 14 In ever loving memory of Pte. GEORGE HOLMAN SLEEMAN 1/7th Middlesex Regiment who was killed in action at Croisilles, France, Aug. 24th 1918, aged 24 years. This window was dedicated by his parents, brothers and sisters. Honour to those in battle slain - who died that we might freedom gain. RIP.
Beneath coloured window picturing Zacharias, brass plaque on window sill.
- 15 In loving memory of WILLIAM HOSKING who entered into rest May 28 1928, RIP.
Coloured window depicting Simeon, inscription in bottom lights.

- 16 In loving memory of CHRISTABEL MATTHEWS died April 2 1907. RIP. Erected by her sister HILDA.
A small brass plaque attached to the lock on iron gates to the entry to the Lady Chapel.
- 17 In loving memory of MINNIE HAMPSON who entered into rest Dec. 18 1899 aged 36. RIP. This window is dedicated by members of the congregation and friends.
Brass plaque under coloured window depicting Saint Elwyn, Martyr in the Lady Chapel (this is the only window depicting the Saint to whom the church is dedicate).It is reputed that, in keeping with a Victorian tradition, the face of the Saint is in the image of the woman to whom the window is dedicated.

Attached to wooden lectern in the Lady chapel.

Table, near font, small brass plaque, inscription worn.
- 20 In loving memory LAURA CORNISH RIP.
Holy water bowl, with angel, small brass plaque, located near entrance door.
- 21 Requiesant in pace. In Grateful Remembrance. 1914 - 18.

Small brass plaque near Station of the Cross.
- 26 In loving memory of MARY LOUISA VAWDREY who entered into rest Sept. 6th 1911.
Coloured glass window depicting Anna, inscription bottom left hand light. A small inscription within the window gives the artists name as T. F. CURTIS, WARD & HUGHES, London, 1914.
- 27 XI. In loving memory of EDITH KEWN Sept. 23 1971.
Small brass plaque near Station of Cross.
- 28 XII. In loving memory of ROBERT JOHN HOPKINS RIP.
Small brass plaque near Station of Cross.
- 29 In ever loving memory of Pte. JOHN VIVIAN NORTHCOTT PEARCE 2/4th London Royal Fusiliers who was killed in action near Albert, France, on August 8th 1918, aged 19 years. This window is dedicated by his mother to her only child. He gave his heart to his home, his life is for his country. *Brass plaque on window ledge beneath coloured glass window which depicts St. Elizabeth and has the inscription "he shall be called God with the artists name - T. F. CURTIS, Ward & HUGHES, London, 1914.*
- 30 XIII. In loving memory of HERBERT & ANNIE COLLINS. RIP.
Small brass plaque near station of the cross.
- 31 A.M.D.G. given by the chapter of St Uny, St Ia, & St Anta. G.S.S.
- 32 Statue of Our lady presented to the glory of God by members of the Choirs and congregation, May 1933.
Silver metal plaque fixed to wooden pedestal which is summounted by an alabaster statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary with child, Located near pillar, south side.
- 33 Presented in loving memory of GEORGE and ELEONORA VAWDREY their surviving daughter ELIZABETH GLASCOTT and MARY LOUISA VAWDREY A.D. 1887.
Brass plaque located on south side low down on concrete wall dividing nave from choir stalls.
- 34 Ad gloriam de. In parentum memoriam GULIELMI et MARGARETTAE HOCKIN, liberi superstites hanc cancellam aedificarunt MDCCCLXXXVIII. Lux perpetua, luceat eis.
Brass plaque, dated 1888, obscured by banner.

- 35 To the glory of God and in affectionate remembrance of WILLIAM RAWLINGS of Downes Hayle dedicated by his daughter EDITH 1902.
In affectionate memory of WILLIAM J. RAWLINGS who died August 1st 1890, dedicated by his wife MARION & sons JOHN & BERNARD. A.D. 1892.
The east window. A pair of typtyches topped by a circular light.
- 36 To the glory of God in loving memory of Rev. A. G. STALLARD vicar of this parish 1892 - 1896, this window is dedicated by those whose lives by his teaching he helped and guided. RIP.
A plaque located high up beneath a window on the north wall of the clerestory.
- 37 This and the two adjoining windows are dedicated to the glory of God in loving memory of GEORGE VANTREY who died Jany. 1st 1915 and as thanks offering for the safe return of their son GEORGE from the great war 1914 - 1918.
Clerestory window, north side.
- 38 In loving memory of ALBERT KEWN 1888 - 1974 and EDITH MAUD KEWN 1893 - 1971.
Black plastic plaque on wooden frame, in church porch.
- 39 In loving memory of MARY PRAHM 1892 - 1965.
Plaque attached to entrance door within porch.
- 40 *Bell.*
- 41 *Foundation stone.*
An outside granite stone carries an embossed Maltese cross. Located on the east wall at ground level this is probably the foundation stone which was laid by Miss Susan Hockin, the daughter of the Rector of Phillack, on August 5th 1886. Various documents were put in a cavity under this stone.

Tall tapering granite obelisk summounted by celtic cross. Large seven sided base with every other side recessed with marble engraved plaque fixed showing WW1 and similar marble plaque attached to the unrecessed sides with WW2. Lettering worn and faded. Located Commercial Road at junction with Chapel Hill, Hayle. An article appeared in the West Briton 9th November 2000 when the Royal British Legion expressed concern about the condition of this memorial. The memorial has since been renovated.

- 46 Crimean Siege Mortar. Harvey's 13" dolphin handle siege mortar cast 1856, weight 5 tons with a choked barrel. Restored by Councillor ROB LELLO for Hayle Town Council 1994. Sponsored by Hayle Pump Newsletter.

A slate plaque fixed to wall on path in Plantation Walk. The grave contained sand, charcoal & ashes, on top of which was a plie os stones. This plaque is appears to be a mistranslation and should read :

“Here in peace lately went to rest SILVANUS husband of CUNANIDE here in the tomb he lies he lived for 33 years.”

INDEX

If a person has more than one surname then there will be two entries in the index. Occasionally this will be because an alias is mentioned, more often there may be a married name and a maiden (given) name. This will aid the researcher who is only aware of one of the names.

If a person appears on more than one memorial there will be a separate entry (and reference number) for each, this means that an individual may appear in the index several times.

If there is no name (for instance "A Sailor" on an official war grave) the entry will be in lower case letters. If there is no personal name but the monument has been included in the register as being of interest then it's type will be entered in the surname field but in lower case letters e.g. Ancient Burial Chamber or Church Bell.

Nicknames or familiar names appear in brackets.

In

some cases the age has been computed from dates/years and therefore may not be accurate. If aged under 1 year then this appears as 0.
